ACTIVITY REPORT 2022

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1. Preface

In 2022, thanks to the leadership of our president, we were able to enjoy collaboration with the collective Science.be. This collective brings together 5 universities: UCLouvain, ULB, ULiège, UMons, UNamur and it coordinated their activities during International Brain Week 2022. To this, the BBC associated the Leuven Brain Institute of KULeuven, a Grande École (Hennalux), a scientific association (EpIC) and a patients' association (Aidants Proches).

In 2022, 8 newsletters (in EN, FR, NL) were published and distributed to a target audience of almost 1,900 people. The guiding principle has always been (and remains) to provide scientifically sound information, and this was particularly exemplified in 2022 by the attention we paid to the validated evidence on the COVID pandemic.

In 2022, the BBC played an important role in the 8th Academy of National Brain Councils (NBCs), held on 10 May at the Permanent Representation of Bavaria to the European Union. This 8th Academy enabled the reactivation of the "Belgian Brain Plan" project, established a lasting dialogue with the federal health minister's office and obtained the agreement of 8 industrial partners to support phase 1 of the project.

In 2022, the BBC continued its partnership with 3 Erasmus-Plus projects and hosted 3 EU4EU trainees.

In 2022, 27 scientific associations, 26 patient associations and 14 industrial partners renewed their membership, showing their confidence in the BBC and thus confirming that the BBC has a composition and legitimacy unique in Belgium and Europe.

The BBC thus weathered the crisis year with resilience and with the confidence of its members, patients, scientists and industry.

2. A word from the President

Thanks to the energy and constant work of our secretary-general, Roland Pochet, the BBC not only continued its activities in 2022 but also launched a long-term project, the Belgian Brain Plan (BBP).

With its actions to realise this plan, the BBC reaffirms its driving role in the dialogue between scientists, patient associations and industrial partners. The BBC also plays a leading role in coordinating the realisation of the BBP with the Belgian authorities.

As numerous as the BBC's actions are, they all contribute to the realisation of its goal: putting the patient at the centre of thinking and concrete actions to better understand and treat brain diseases.

We thank all those who have contributed in any way to the creation of these actions and to all those who support us as members of the BBC.

3. Activities 2022

3.1 BBC and Brain Awareness Week 2022 14-20 March 2022



In the 27 years since its inception, International Brain Week has grown into a global educational initiative involving more than 8,000 partners in 120 countries. During the 2022 campaign, partner activities took place in 45 countries and 33 states. For Belgium, six universities (KULeuven, UcLouvain, ULB, ULiège, UMons and UNamur), one Grande Ecole (Hennalux), one scientific association (EpIC) and one

3.3 Belgian Brain Plan

Spurred by the 8th Academy of National Brain Councils, held on 10 May at Bavaria's prestigious Permanent Representation to the EU, the concept of a National Brain Plan was relaunched (see newsletter no 28 of April-May). For Belgium, on 16 July, the BBC task force sent a letter to Dr Ri De Ridder, former president of the NIHDI and currently advisor to the federal health minister, Mr Frank Vandenbroucke, explaining what the BBC, which is particularly concerned about the lack of a registry for neurological and psychiatric diseases, is willing and able to do to meet the urgent need to create such a registry. https://nl.braincouncil.be/_files/ugd/5e315e_a1a94c0a1ab2473f90e5d8f0bb42fb21.pdf) opened the door of the minister's office and a 60-minute meeting took place on 27 October between 4 members of the task force (Jean Schoenen, Dirk Van Roost, Lia le Roy and Roland Pochet) and Mr Nick Marly, adviser to minister Vandenbroucke on eHealth, mHealth and Health Data (cfr. https://nl.braincouncil.be/_files/ugd/327c04_0507c205e8814110bd37b6d1b955b0b7.pdf). This will be followed by a second meeting in January 2023.

At the same time, building on our partnership with the pharmaceutical industry, the BBC has signed 8 sponsorship contracts of €33,000 to enable the implementation of phase 1 of this Belgian Brain Plan.

For this challenge, the BBC's strategy also relies on the publication on 30 May 2022 of REGULATION (EU) 2022/868 OF THE EUROPEAN PARLIAMENT AND THE COUNCIL on European data management.



3.4 BBC and Erasmus+

As a reminder, Erasmus+ is the EU programme to support education, training, youth and sport in Europe. It has an estimated budget of €26.2 billion. The 2021-2027 programme focuses on social inclusion, green and digital transitions and promoting youth participation in democratic life.

It was instigated by Spyros Zorbas, president of the Greek association EPIONI, a member of the BBC, with which the BBC associated, responding along with other associations from Spain, Italy, Latvia and Serbia to calls under Erasmus+ Key Action 2 (KA2) aimed at small-scale partnerships.

EPIONI is a Greek NPO founded in 2016 by citizens who are informal carers. It aims to support people working as unpaid and informal carers of family members or friends struggling with physical or mental illness, disability or addiction.

Small-scale partnerships are designed to make the programme more accessible to small actors and hard-to-reach people in school education, adult education, vocational education and training. This key activity KA2 should lead to the development, transfer and/or implementation of innovative practices at organisational, local, regional, national or European level. These actions are managed by national agencies, in our case the French-speaking Agency for Lifelong Learning (AEF-Europe).

By 2022, the BBC is active in three Erasmus Plus projects, two as coordinator and one as partner;



In support of the Erasmus Plus programme, the BBC has registered as a host institution for the EU4EU programme, which has created an international community connecting universities, businesses, students and young professionals across Europe.

Editor's note: to be eligible for Erasmus+ and EU4EU calls, the BBC must meet ethics and transparency criteria, which are assessed before being included in the transparency register. The BBC's identification number is 712814020585-47.



4. EBC-BBC

The new statutes of the EBC (17 pages) were published in the Belgian Official Gazette on 18 December 2022. We highlight three articles in particular: article 8 lays down the conditions for accessibility as a member of the National Brain Councils (NBCs). The BBC meets these conditions, is a member and pays an annual contribution (250€ for 2023) in accordance with Article 14. There are currently 7 NBC members: Belgium, Spain, France, Norway, Portugal, Serbia and Sweden. Article 27(3) states that 2 representatives may participate in the board and be heard, but without voting rights.

5. BBC website

The annual presentation of website traffic is part of the BBC's transparency policy. It gives a picture of its impact and prominence. Moreover, as members are usually spread over a wide geographical area, our site is an essential tool for promoting new opportunities, providing information on membership or renewal of membership and disseminating content and resources intended only for members.


Website statistics 2022





In 2022, the site registered 1,485 visits and for an average duration of 4 min 13 seconds (which is remarkable!).

Most visitors are in Belgium (84%), spread across 182 cities. The remaining 16% are spread across 32 countries.
